

Through Operation Encompass the police will ensure that you are informed about:

ALL DVA incidents both crime and non-crime Child to parent abuse Abuse in teenage relationships

Notifications from the police should be prior to the start of the next school day (by 8.30am)

Notifications of incidents that occurred during holidays should be shared

Context of the incident, including where the child was, should be given so that you can properly understand and support the child

Voice of the child should be included in the report




This handbook summarises the changes that we want to see in response to children being recognised as victims of DA. Many of the recommendations can be enacted by both schools, health and police, others require national action.



This Child's Victim Support Code can be adopted by all agencies that work with children, including police, schools, Education Leads, Social Care, Health, Child Safeguarding Partnerships, PCCs, the Home Office and the UK Government.



This document succinctly explains some of the ways in which a school can implement the Child's Victim Support Code.



This poster is the Child's Victim Support Code in language appropriate for children and can, therefore, be displayed in school and used as a resource in the teaching of the domestic abuse strand of the RSE/HE curriculum.






This Handbook summaries some of the very simple ways in which school staff children can support experiencing DA. The handbook stresses that we not expecting are teachers and staff to be therapists or counsellors whilst recognising the positive tremendously impact that schools can have for vulnerable children.



This Handbook, supported by the Home Office, the DfE and NASEN, explains why we should recognise children experiencing DA as one of the vulnerable groups within our schools and then what actions we should take to support these children.



This Handbook explores how schools can teach the DA aspect of the RE/RSE/HE curriculum form nursery through to KS5. Key themes are identified which schools can use to thread into their current work.



This Handbook explores how Operation Encompass works between a police force and schools. It is a general but helpful guide for anyone involved in Operation Encompass or those who are wishing to implement Operation Encompass.
