





#### The Wilderness Years

- Defined social work as care brokerage & delivered from the heart of regulations, licencing & enforcement.
- Process led practices and conveyor belts of care
- Medical model approach to integration that sees Local Authorities divest themselves of mental health social work
- Impact:
  - Home Care and private Care Home Markets mass expansion
  - Outsourcing of care and support provided by Local Authorities
  - High care home placements for all client groups & the rise of the safeguarding industry
  - Health inequalities social work diverted from tackling social justice
  - Rise of managerialism and devaluing of professional social work skills














# We are always in the midst of the messy stuff, finding ways forwards

## Social Workers are Allies and Accomplices

- We stand in solidarity, accomplices disrupting the disabling impact of societal forces on people with disabilities
- Our human rights framework:
  - UNCRPD Article 12 uphold wishes, feelings and beliefs
  - ECHR Article 1, Protocol 1 any decision taken must be necessary, proportionate and it must lead to the situation being better for P, as P defines better, than what went before
  - UNCRC Article 9 and ECHR Article 5 any decision taken must be in the person's best interest
  - Human Rights Act
  - Mental Capacity Statutory Principles and Mental Health Act Guiding Principles
